
The many forms of "gun violence"


- Suicide by firearm (approx. 24,000 deaths)
- Community gun homicide (approx. 18,000)
 - includes interpersonal conflicts and shootings related to gangs/groups or underlying crime
- Domestic violence (approx. 2,000)
- Unintentional shootings (approx. 500)
- Police-involved shootings (approx. 1,000)
- Mass public shootings (approx. 100)


Major retailers are selling bulletproof backpacks, as parents and kids fear more school shootings

% change in annual U.S. murder rate per 100,000 people




Note: 2020 data is provisional. While the U.S. murder rate rose 30% in 2020, it remained below the levels of earlier decades.



1990-2021; 2021 data is through Dec. 5







The US has the highest firearm homicide rate in the developed world

In 2019, the number of US deaths from gun violence was about 4 per 100,000 people. That's 18 times the average rate in other developed countries. Multiple studies show access to guns contributes to higher firearm-related homicide rates.





- Mostly at night
- Most common location outside
- Other victims 30%
- Perpetrator arrested 57%

Data Reveals Violence Among Youth Under 18 Has Not Spiked in the Pandemic

Throughout the pandemic, a flurry of alarming news coverage and inflammatory rhetoric from politicians have appeared in national¹ and local² media highlighting serious violent crimes by youth. The issue has generated considerable political attention in Congress³ and across the country, and it has fueled

scarce evidence of a youth-led crime wave. Rather, most of the data suggest that youth violence has been flat or declining.

The share of crimes in the U.S. committed by youth has fallen by more than half over the past

Bipartisan Safer Communities Act

- Amending who needs a federal license to buy and sell firearms
- Enhanced background check for young people ages 18-21
- Providing states with funding to implement extreme risk protection order programs
- Expand access to community and school-based behavioral health services for children and families
- Training for school personnel and other adults to detect and respond to mental health issues
- \$1 billion to help schools put in place comprehensive strategies to create safe and healthy learning environments for all students.

Addresses the complete systems of pathways and precursors to violence.


Examines and responds to the root causes of violence at the individual, institutional, and societal level.
